O'Shea Invites Residents to Help A Hero

This June, Alderman Matt O'Shea, the Chicago Park District, and Military Outreach USA will host the second annual Operation Help-A-Hero, a household item collection drive supporting veterans transitioning out of homelessness in Chicago. On any given night, there are approximately 1,000 homeless Veterans in the City. Since 2014, thousands of these American heroes have found permanent housing; unfortunately, many still lack the most basic household items you and I take for granted



Operation Help-A-Hero asks all Chicagoans to consider purchasing one or more of these items to donate to a veteran in need. Donations will

be accepted at sixty-five Aldermanic Offices and Chicago Park District locations throughout the City during the month of June. All items collected will be delivered to the United States' Af-Veteran's fairs Office and

distributed to qualifying veterans throughout the Chicagoland area.

Local drop off locations include Alderman O'Shea's office at 10400 S. Western Ave., Monday through Friday from 9:00am - 5:00pm, and Mount Greenwood Park, 3721 W. 111th St., Monday through Friday from 10:00am - 10:00pm, Saturday from 9:00am - 2:00pm, and Sunday from 9:00am - 5:00pm. Despite recent progress on this issue, there are currently hundreds of homeless veterans who live either unsheltered or in shelters throughout the

> City. "It is our duty as citizens to take care of those who have served and protected our country by getting our veterans back on their feet and successful in private life. It is my hope through this program that we will col-

lect thousands of donations that can help the veterans who have sacrificed so much for our freedom." said Matthew J. O'Shea, 19th Ward Alderman.

Please note, Operation Help-A-Hero is seeking new, store bought items only. A full list of requested products is below. PERSONAL HY-GIENE: bath soap, shampoo, conditioner, razors, shaving cream,

deodorant, combs, hair brushes, nail clippers, toothpaste, toothbrushes; KITCHEN & CLEANING ITEMS: kitchen trash cans (plastic), Windex, Pine Sol, dishwashing liquid, dishcloths, sponges, mops, buckets, brooms, dustpans, paper towels; BATHROOM & MISCELLA-NEOUS ITEMS: shower curtains, toilet paper (4 or 6 pack), plungers, toilet brushes, toilet bowl cleaner, bath towels (2), wash cloths, smoke detectors w/ batteries, flashlights w/ batteries, garbage bags, laundry baskets, hampers, and laundry detergent.

Operation Help-A-Hero is a 501 (c) (3) public charity dedicated to the well-being and care of our American military members. Their programs support military units and families as they prepare for separation, while they endure the challenges of deployment, and as they transition back to the US. Pilot Program Targets Flooding at Mt. Greenwood Park

Alderman Matt O'Shea, the Chicago Park District and the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (MWRD) have announced the installation of an experimental energy-passive groundwater recharge product (EGRP) system to mitigates standing water on dedicated test plots at Mount Greenwood Park, 3721 W. 111th Street in Chicago. The project has an \$80,000 budget and is being funded by the Chicago Park District and MWRD.

This innovative system, patented by the Michigan-based Parjana Distribution Corporation (PDC), manages storm water in an ecofriendly and sustainable way without impacting existing sewer lines. The EGRP system is installed vertically into the ground, and Parjana is confident that they will dramatically increase the rate of infiltration, enhancing natural conditions, and allowing the water to be drained back

into the earth instead of into our sewer system. This is the first pilot project in Chicago. However, Parjana has over 200 full scale commercial installations on a global basis.

The Parjana system was in-

stalled in the ballfields at Mount Greenwood Park in early May, the system requires an acclimation period. Previous pilots have experienced continued improvements in system performance over time. Historically, these fields have flooded even after a modest rainfall creating regular cancellations for athletic leagues and special events at the Park.

Following the twelve week acclimation period, the EGRP system is expected to enhance drainage at this location, allow the storm water to be managed onsite and reduce the flow of water into local sewers. Everyone is hoping the system can deliver more reliable ballfields and show a reduction in residential flooding in the area.

This pilot project represents a public private partnership funded by the Chicago Park District, MWRD and Parjana. Moving forward, the MWRD will collect data to measure the impact of the system. If successful, the Parjana system could be used to address flooding problems in other areas across the City.



New Business Developments

Open Outcry Brewing Company on Western Ave.

Open Outcry Brewing Company will soon open at 10934 S. Western Ave., replacing O'Brien's Pub. The 4,000-square foot brewpub will feature a wide selection of beers brewed on site, craft cocktails and wine, Neapolitan style pizzas, sliders, salads and other comfort foods. Owner and Beverly resident John Brand looks forward to a June opening of the new business.

For the past several months, crews have worked around-the-clock to complete a major renovation of the former O'Brien's location, as well as three adjacent store fronts. The renovation included constructing a new glass-wall façade facing Western Avenue that will greatly enhance the aesthetics of the streetscape. Once completed, the building will feature an open floor plan allowing patrons to observe the brewing process as well as the pizza kitchen. It will also include a working glass garage door facing Western Avenue that will allow for open-air dining. The floorplan will include taproom seating for approximately 110 people. Other features will include a reclaimed food truck

and wood fired antique stove fireplace.

resident Tom Nagel,


Zubaty, hand built each tap room table using reclaimed materials sourced from a barn in central Illinois. The centerpiece will be an 18-foot community table made from reclaimed floor joist timbers from a hardware store that was deconstructed in Colfax, Illinois that

dated back to the late-1800's. Additionally, Brand partnered with 19th Ward resident Nathan Lichtenfeld of Chicago Alliance Builders to general contract the construction effort. Artists in the Beverly Area Arts Alliance will paint a mural in the tap room. Lastly, Brand purchased fermentation tanks from Neil Byers and Horse Thief Hollow.

Brand is excited to bring a new, vibrant business to the 19th Ward. "I feel a tremendous amount of

gratitude for all the help, encouragement and support I've received from everyone in the neighborhood. It's been amazing. We're determined to deliver an amenity that our neighbors are proud of, will enjoy and that complements all the other great businesses in the Ward," Brand said.

City Shuts Down Epic Luxury Boutique

At approximately 1:00am on Sunday, April 23, 2017 the Chicago Police Department responded to a late night party at Epic Luxury Boutique. CPD officers shut down the party and issued citations. On April 27th, the Chicago Department of **Business Affairs & Consumer Pro**tection (BACP) issued violations for operating without a business license and deceptive practices. They also issued cease and desist orders prohibiting the business from hosting any events or parties where admission is charged and serving alcohol to patrons.

Following the issuance of these violations, Epic Luxury failed to obtain the appropriate permits in the ten day period. As such, they are legally prohibited from operating at this location. Should anyone see business activities occurring at 2144 W. 95th St., they are asked to call 9-1-1 immediately. The entire community thanks the Chicago Police Department and the Department of Business Affairs & Consumer Protection for their great work on this public safety matter.

Street Light Modernization Moves Forward

On Wednesday, April 21, 2017, the Chicago City Council passed an ordinance that will modernize Chicago's streetlight system, replacing 85% of Chicago's public lighting with reliable, high quality fixtures. The project, managed by the Chicago Infrastructure Trust, will begin this summer on the south and west side of the City. In total, 270,000 light fixtures

will be replaced and a

installed

City a stateof-the-art
smart lighting grid.

The Chicago Smart Lighting Project is expected to be completed in four years and cost \$160 million. The vendor team is led by Ameresco Inc., a national leader in the field of energy efficiency. In the first year, work will be focused in neighborhoods with heightened public safety concerns allowing them to more quickly reap the benefits of clearer and more reliable lighting. However, to ensure all Chicagoans benefit from this project in year one, installation will also take place along a dozen main arterial streets. A more

precise schedule should be made public later this summer.

These new lights, which will be owned and operated by the City, will consume 50-75% less electricity than the existing lights, generating significant cost savings that will be utilized to fund this project. In addition to the replacement of approximately 270,000 street and alley lights, the project will install a man-

agement system that will allow for remote moni-

of the outdoor lighting


system. This improvement should greatly improve repair time when a light goes out for some reason. It will also allow lighting levels to be controlled remotely. There will also be limited stabili-

There will also be limited stabilization and repair of existing light poles and wiring on an as-needed basis based with available funds.

More than half of the light fix-

More than half of the light fixtures in at least the first year will be assembled in Chicago and Ameresco has committed to using City residents to perform at least 50% of the work on the project. Ameresco has also expressed a strong preference for hiring veterans. Initial work is expected to begin later this summer.





Major Improvements Coming to Local Public Schools

This year, Mayor Emanuel and Alderman O'Shea announced several major improvement projects at local public schools. This year, work will begin on a new therapeutic riding barn at the Chicago High School for Agricultural Sciences, and new annexes at Esmond Elementary School and Mount Greenwood Elementary School. Updates on those projects are below.

Chicago High School for Agricultural Sciences: On Wednesday, April 5th, a groundbreaking ceremony was held for the new 15,800 square-foot therapeutic-riding barn. This project has a \$1.2 million budget and is expected to be completed in late 2017. The barn will allow the school to expand its therapeutic riding program to service children and adults with special needs as well as veterans battling post-traumatic stress disorder.

Mount Greenwood Elementary School: This Fall, work will begin on a new annex to alleviate severe overcrowding at this high performing neighborhood school. The annex will have thirteen classrooms and a Science classroom. The construction project has a budget of \$20 million with a tentative completion date in early 2019.

Esmond Elementary School: This Fall, construction will begin on a new annex building at Esmond Elementary School. The annex will include one classroom, an art room, computer lab, science lab, library and lunchroom with kitchen. Through this project, the existing modular building will be demolished and a new artificial turf field and play lot will be installed. This project has a budget of \$20 million with a tentative completion date in early 2019.



MWRD Offers Free Fertilizer

The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District will be offering free Crystal Green fertilizer to 19th Ward residents at the 95th Street Farmers Market (95th & Longwood Dr.) on Sunday, June 4, 2017 from 9:00am-1:00pm. Residents can receive one vial of continuous release nutrient fertilizer while supplies last. Crystal Green will be offered on a first come, first served basis.

Nutrients, such as phosphorus, are recovered from wastewater and

transformed into a high-value fertilizer. Crystal Green is a continuous release nutrient technology that provides root activated phosphorus, along with nitrogen and magnesium, in one citrate soluble granule. It is proven to increase yields and optimize plant performance in high pH soils. In increases fertilizer efficiency and minimizes excess phosphorus in the soil, lowering the risk of tie-up, leaching, and run-off.

Blood donors must be at least 18 years old (16 or 17 years old with signed parental consent form), weigh at least 110 pounds, and be in generally good physical health. Be sure to eat a healthy

meal (low-fat and iron rich foods) at least two hours before donating blood and drink plenty of non-caf-

feinated beverages in the days leading up to your donations. Do not smoke for at least one hour before donating and do not chew gum, mints, or candy immediately before or during your appointment. Also,

avoid exercise or strenuous activity before an immediately after donating.

On the day of your donation, please make sure to bring a driver's licensing, passport, state ID or birth certificate with accompanying photo ID. A student or employee ID with full name and photo are also accepted. You will also need a list of medications you are taking and list of places visited outside of the United States in the past three years. Sign up today at www.the19thward. com.

Cook County Assessor Property Tax Appeals

The Cook County Assessor property tax appeal process for Lake Township, which includes the 19th Ward, is tentatively scheduled to open August 8, 2017. Yearly assessment notices will be mailed notifying residents of the 30 day window to file an appeal. This will be the first opportunity to appeal 2017 taxes payable in 2018. The second op-

tion to appeal is administered through the Cook County Board of Review, which opens in the fall. Look for more information about the Board of Review appeal process in the August Quarterly. It can be beneficial to file appeals with both agencies. Common reasons to file an appeal with the Assessor are lack

of uniformity with similar properties within the same neighborhood code, overvaluation based on recent sales and significant property description errors. This appeal process is for 2017 property taxes which are due in 2018. Ap-

peals can be made in person at any Cook County Assessor office, online at www.cookcountyassessor. com or appeal forms are available at both 19th Ward offices

However, if you prefer to purchase your sticker in person, Alderman Matt O'Shea and City Clerk Anna Valencia will host sales on Thursday, May 25th from 12:00pm-4:00pm at Ridge Park, 9625 S. Longwood Dr., and Wednesday, June 21st from 12:00pm-4:00pm at the 19th Ward's Mount Greenwood Service Office, 3215 W. 111th St. To purchase a vehicle sticker, you must bring your 2017 Chicago City Vehi-

cle Sticker courtesy reminder form. If your courtesy reminder is lost, please bring your State Vehicle Registration ID Card, which includes your Vehicle Identification Number (VIN). Check, money order, Visa, Mastercard, Amex and Discover Card are accepted at Ward Sales. Please remember, we are now in the year-round vehicle sticker era. Ward sales this year will be limited to customers with June vehicle sticker expirations. These are vehicles with "6/17" printed on them with an expiration date of June 30th. Remember, the 15 day grace period is NO LONGER in effect; motorists with a June 30th expiration date must have their sticker displayed by July 1st to avoid a \$200 ticket.

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O'Shea Ordinance Targets Human Trafficking

Alderman Matt O'Shea and the Chicago Department of Business Affairs & Consumer Protection (BACP) recently proposed changes

to massage business regulations in an effort to increase the City's ability to combat human traf-O'Shea ficking. and BACP worked closely with the Chicago Police Department, the antihuman trafficking and community licensed massage therapists to put forth a package that not only enhances public safety, but also reduces regulations on existing, high quality mas-

sage businesses.

While the majority of massage parlors are legitimate business operations, a small percentage operate as a front for both sex and labor trafficking. This ordinance makes it easier for law enforcement and BACP to inspect and investigate businesses suspected of human trafficking. It also provides the tools to shut down those ventures. Simultaneously, the ordinance removes barriers for legitimate massage therapists to build small businesses in our communities.

"I am proud of this effort which makes it easier for our City agencies to crack down on illicit massage parlors as well as to identify some of the most vulnerable victims in our communities. This ordinance mandates preventative measures. Not only

will we make our communities safer, we also will provide the opportunity for legitimate small business growth in Chicago" said Alderman O'Shea.

Often times, victims of hu-

man trafficking are treated as criminals under the law. To address that, this ordinance provides for an affirmative defense for any person arrested for prostitution who was in fact a human trafficking victim. It also increases the age to 18 from 15 years-old for em-

ployment as a massage therapist.

- Ensure all customer's sexual or genital areas are covered at all times when in the presence of an employee, agent or independent contractor;
- Post signage identifying the place of business as a message therapy establishment and stating its trade or business name;
- Give all prospective customers a written notice stating the Illinois

State law prohibition against solicitation;

- Pass a pre-license inspection and consent to inspections by authorized City employees and police; and
- Provide prospective customers with a written price list of all services.
- Further, the ordinance prohibits massage establishments from...
- Allowing any person under the influence of alcohol or drugs to enter or remain on the premises, or providing or receiving a massage;
- Employing or contracting with any person as a massage therapist who does not hold a current, valid license issued by the State of Illinois; and
- Having an entrance or exit-way providing direct passageway to any residence.

In addition, the ordinance removes the existing requirement for separate dressing, locker and / or massage room facilities for female and male patrons and exempts foot and chair massage establishments from the requirement to obtain a city license. This ordinance will be introduced at the next Chicago City Council meeting on May 24th, and will subsequently be heard by the Committee on Licensing & Consumer Protection.






Improvements Coming to Dan Ryan Woods

Legislative Update

Cunningham Legislation Protects Senior Citizens

Seniors throughout Illinois could receive legal protections to help them live safely and affordably in their homes as they age under legislation being pushed by Senator Bill Cunningham.

"Seniors should be able to live their golden years without concern about their safety or financial well-



being," Cunningham said. "We as a community should be finding unique and new ways to protect and support those who dedicated their lives trying to protect and support many of us."

Cunningham recently passed Senate Bills 1676 and 1978, companion legislation that will help ensure home care agencies that are hired to provide services to seniors are properly licensed. The state licensing process ensures that workers who go into homes of seniors are properly trained, insured, and have undergone criminal background checks. The legislation would also require that hospitals only refer discharged patients to home care agencies that properly screen their employees.

"Seniors or their family members who hire home care workers are sometimes taken advantage of by fly-by-night agencies that pose as cost efficient providers," Cunningham said. "This can lead to situations where seniors are victimized in their own homes by caregivers who are not properly screened. Senate Bills 1676 and 1978 will help combat these situations."

Another piece of legislation passed by Senator Cunningham, Senate Bill 1979, would relieve seniors of the burden of having to annually re-apply to Cook County for their senior property tax exemption. Because of a current state law, seniors must fill out burdensome paperwork every year to maintain their property tax break, which could save them hundreds of dollars annually. Confusion over the law has led to seniors losing the homestead exemption when they fail to re-apply with the county. Cunningham's legislation would allow seniors to apply just once and keep the exemption in place as long as they own the home.

"Keeping seniors safe, inde-

pendent, and financially secure in their own homes should not only be a personal goal for our families, it should be a policy goal for state government," Cunningham said. "If seniors are unable to live independently in their homes, they often have to move to nursing facilities. That's not only an undesirable outcome for individual seniors, but it becomes very expensive for the tax-payers who subsidize nursing facilities through the Medicaid program.

"That is why I have consistently pushed legislation to protect seniors both from crime and financial distress," Cunningham said. "Keeping our older family members and neighbors safely in their own homes is a 'win-win' situation -- both for the quality of life for seniors and the financial well-being of the state."

All three pieces of legislation passed the Illinois Senate and now move to the Illinois House for further consideration.

Hurley's Bill Offers Relief for Small Businesses

Local employers would receive relief from high workers' compensation costs under legislation sponsored by state Rep. Fran Hurley, D-35. House Bill 2622 establishes a non-profit workers' compensation insurer as an alternative for Illinois businesses tired of paying high premiums to for-profit insurance companies, and seeks to eliminate fraud while protecting workers injured on the job through no fault of their own. The bill passed the House in April and will move on to the Senate for consideration.

"Illinois workers' compensation claims and costs have fallen significantly in recent years, but many small and medium-sized businesses are rightly concerned that they are not seeing these savings reflected in their workers' compensation insurance premiums," said Hurley. "Outof-state for-profit insurance companies are taking in massive profits while local businesses struggle with high costs."

Some Springfield politicians are pushing to further pad corporate profits by demanding changes to workers' compensation that will jeopardize the economic security of workers hurt on the job. But, Hurley is working towards real reforms that would help small and medium-sized employers save money while maintaining protection for employees. House Bill 2622 provides for the Illinois Employers Mutual Insurance Company to offer the same quality insurance as for-profit companies, while holding a com-

mitment to delivering the best value to businesses, not turning a profit for investors. The competition will also encourage for-profit insurers to offer lower-cost options to Illinois employers.

Additionally, Hurley supported reforms that require for-profit insurance companies to pass savings from workers' compensation reform on to Illinois employers. House Bill 2525 gives the Department of Insurance authority to review insurance rates before they become effective and reject those it finds excessive.

"To make Illinois competitive, we must look for ways to decrease costs on small and medium-sized employers to ensure they have the resources they need to thrive in Illinois. These bills will make Illinois a

more competitive place to do business by ensuring businesses are seeing the benefit of the reforms," said Hurley.



Ag School Legislation Opens More Local Seats

Families in Mount Greenwood, Beverly and Morgan Park could soon see increased enrollment opportunities to the Chicago High School for Agricultural Sciences (CHAS) because of legislation passed by the Illinois Senate.

Senate Bill 447, sponsored by State Senator Bill Cunningham (D-Chicago), would allow for 40 more seats to be opened up to local families and would statutorily authorize the special education cluster that currently exists at the school.

"The Ag School provides a unique, nationally recognized high school education to CPS student right in our backyard," Cunningham said. "Anytime it is possible, we should increase access to quality academic programs for all students, including diverse learners."

CHAS was created by state law

more than 20 years ago. The enabling legislation that established the school included an enrollment cap that requires legislative approval to increase attendance levels. SB special 447 would enable CHAS to gradu-

to 800 students.

ly competitive, as more than 3,000 eighth graders from throughout the city apply to the school every year. But legislation passed by Cunning-

ham in 2011 ensures local families get a leg up on admission by legally requiring that 50 percent of the enrollment at CHAS must be residents of the 19th Ward.

CHAS has provided special education cluster services for years, but those programs were not recognized by state law until the introduction of Senate Bill 447 this year, which will enable CPS to in-

crease the cluster program's enrollment to 80 students.

"The unique agriculture curriculum at CHAS that attracts so many applicants should be available to diverse learners, too," Cunningham said. "And the welcoming of those students should be officially recognized in the state law that established the Ag School. SB 447 helps accomplish those goals, which will provide security for families in our community who deserve top notch educational opportunities close to home for all their children."

The legislation now moves to the Illinois House, where it is sponsored by State Representative Fran Hurley.



Mercy Circle's John 'Jack' Haberkorn likes his new life

As a Commander in the Chicago Police Department until age 55, fol-

lowed by nine years serving as Police Chief in Oak Lawn, John 'Jack' Haberkorn knows how to handle challenges. But caring for the love of his life, his wife Pearl, became increasingly difficult as her health declined last year. So, Jack and Pearl moved into Mercy Circle on December 15, 2016.

"I couldn't take

care of her. And I could no longer take care of myself," he explains. "We resisted the idea at first. So, it is ironic I would end up at this care center. And Mercy Circle is what I would call a care center, not a nursing home. Here, my wife and I are very well provided for. The staff takes excellent care of both of us." Jack, who lives in a main floor apartment in the assisted living wing, uses a walker and motorized cart to get around the building. His most important daily appointments are lunch and dinner with his wife of 73 vears, Pearl, who lives on the third floor and receives skilled nursing

"I fed Pearl all the time before we got here," Jack says, "but now she is able to feed herself. So maybe I wasn't helping her in the right

> way. I get to spend time just enjoying her company every day and that is what I look forward to the most."

> Jack and Pearl have plenty of visitors: Their seven children still live in the Chicago area, but schedule visits in groups to avoid crowds. Jack points to a framed photo hanging on the wall of his

apartment showing most of the Haberkorn clan including the firstgeneration children, 20 grandchildren and 38 great-grandchildren. "The 39th grandchild is on the way," Jack says. No divorces, he says, and adds, "Their mother ran a tight ship."

Jack Haberkorn, 90, moved into the as-

sisted living wing at Mercy Circle in De-

cember 2016. His wife of 73 years, Pearl,

needs skilled nursing care and lives on

the third floor. They get together twice

each day for lunch and dinner.

The Haberkorns grew up and attended St. Cajetan Parish School, at 2445 W. 112th St., just down the block from their home. "There were 30 kids on that street," Jack explains. "We had a lot of great block parties and in summer everyone was out on the driveway playing basketball, hopscotch, or jump rope."

Though Jack enjoyed a very successful career rising through the ranks of the Chicago Police Department, none of his descendants chose to follow him into law enforcement. "I saw some terrible things when I was on the job," Jack says. "The worst tragedy was the fire in 1958 on December 1st at Our Lady of Angels School." Two nuns and 92 children were killed in the fire that consumed the large Catholic elementary school on the city's west side.

"My oldest son is an electrical engineer and he just retired at 71," Jack says. For now, Jack is content to stay indoors visiting Pearl, watching cable TV— "mostly old police shows"—and "not having to cook." Once the weather improves he can drive the car he keeps at the retirement community and plans to get out more.

"I'm very content here," Jack, who is 90 years old, says with a smile. He moves his arm to show his surroundings, "Everything is taken care of and I don't have to remember anyone's name. I just call everyone, 'Sister.'"





Smith Village welcomes new residents with Trial Stay program

Jacque Ward only recently became a 19th Ward resident. In April, she officially moved from her condo in Oak Lawn to Smith Village, a life plan community at 2320 W. 113th Place. She does have, however, strong ties to the neighborhood because her father, Alfred Larke, a construction contractor, built several homes in Beverly during the 1940s. She also recalls swimming at Kennedy Park around that time.

Like many Smith Village residents, she grew up on Chicago's South Side. "I never lived North of 83rd Street," said Ward, who graduated from Calumet High School and grew up on the 8600 block of Aberdeen—"kitty corner to St. Kilian Parish," her family's congregation.

Thanks to Smith Village's Trial Stay program, which makes it possible for prospective residents to rent an apartment for a standard monthly fee for up to three months, Ward found making the decision to relocate much easier.

Like others who have participated in Smith Village's Trial Stay program, Ward said having the chance to see what life is like at Smith Village, without having to decide on permanent residency, eliminated concerns about making a wrong choice.

In February, she moved temporarily into a fully furnished one-bedroom apartment with a convenient kitchen equipped with dishware, a

washer and dryer and linens. Maid service was provided bi-weekly, just as it is for permanent residents.

According to Marti Jatis, Smith Village's executive director, "Our Trial Stay program includes the opportunity to benefit from services and amenities enjoyed by all independent living residents. We think it's a great way for people to experience all we have to offer, including onsite entertainment, craft and horticulture workshops, field trips including transportation, and delicious, healthy meals prepared by our executive chef. We encourage Trial Stay residents to entertain their family and friends in our private dining rooms, and make use of the library, craft room and meeting spaces. Many choose to attend religious services offered onsite every week."

With a doctor's okay, temporary residents can participate in the fitness program. Smith Village's wellness center, completed in April, includes a salon, spa, workout room and space for exercise classes. Coming soon to Smith Village is an onsite movie theater featuring surround sound.

In April, after paying her entrance fee for permanent residency, Ward moved her furniture and belongings into her permanent one-bedroom apartment plus den, which offers a pleasing third-floor view of a courtyard. "After my hus-

band passed away, my son and daughter didn't want me living alone," said Ward, whose husband, Walter, was a retired Chicago Police

lieutenant. "Everybody was so nice here, I just decided to stay."

Ward proud of her new place. She selected paint colors for the walls-seafoam green, robin's egg blue and peach/ pink-and new flooring and carpeting. "They really did a great job painting," she said. Ward had her furniture reupholstered to match her new décor palette.

She especially enjoys her spa-

cious den. It's flooded with natural light, which allows her to pursue variety of creative interests—sewing and needlepoint; painting with watercolors, oils and acrylics; making leaded glass works of art and jewelry, and working with leather. She's already set up her sewing machine and fabric storage rack. She's also created a couple of watercolor paintings since moving in.

As a young woman, Ward worked for four years as a secretary in a doctor's office. She later devoted her life to raising her son,

Patrick, who lives in Mt. Greenwood, and her daughter, Michelle, now a dietitian at Little Company of Mary Hospital and resident of Evergreen Park. Ward has three grandchildren, Fiona, Tricia and Sean.

Smith Village is a hub of intergenerational activity, attracting young volunteers and singing groups from nearby schools. The Marketplace Café attracts many families for Saturday lunch. There's

also an onsite game room featuring bumper pool and other game setups for young visitors.

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
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
