Park District Invests in Our Community


The Chicago Park District is making major investments in our community this year. In addition to the construction of the Morgan Park Sports Center at 115th and Western Ave., they will also be converting two of the tennis courts at Kennedy Park into roller hockey courts and installing new playgrounds at Barnard Park and Mag-

gie Cosme Park.

The construction contract for the Morgan Park Sports Center is currently open to bidders. All bids are due by Friday, May 16th; more information can be found at www.chicagoparkdistrict.com. The project manager expects to award the contract in June and break ground in July, 2014. The facility will take

approximately one year to build. The closure of 115th Street will coincide with the start of construction.

Improvements are also underway to the Kennedy Park tennis courts.



Two of the existing four courts are being converted to roller hockey courts; the remaining two tennis courts will be repaired, resurfaced, sealed, and color coated. New vinyl clad chain link fence and gates will also be installed and all existing drains and sewer lines will be cleaned. This project is scheduled for completion in October, 2014.

Playgrounds at Barnard Park and Maggie Cosme Park have been selected for reconstruction in 2014 through the Chicago Plays! Program. This Fall both playgrounds will be renovated with new equip-

ment, updated swing sets, and fiber wood chip surfacing. Ridge Park and Graver Park received similar improvements last year.

The Chicago Plays! Program is an aggressive effort of the Chicago Park District, City of Chicago and Friends of the Parks to rehabilitate 300 playgrounds over a five-year period. Currently, we are in year two of that timeline. Funding for the playground equipment comes from the Chicago Park District's capital improvement budget; for more information please visit www.fotp.org.

have done a tremendous job of bringing this vacant eyesore property back to life.






will also be present to address individual concerns from residents.

Check Out This Year's Memorial Day Parade!

The Beverly Hills / Morgan Park / Mount Greenwood Memorial Day Parade, one of Chicago's oldest neighborhood parades, is coming up on Monday, May 26, 2014. The Memorial Day Parade Committee is encouraging more families, clubs, businesses, institutions, and churches to participate in the march down historic Longwood Drive. The parade, and following Memorial Day ceremony and flag raising in Ridge Park, honors all those from our community who have served in the



United States Armed Forces.

The parade begins at 10:30 am, immediately following the 37th Annual Ridge Run, and travels north down Longwood Drive from 110th Street to Ridge Park. The Ridge Run, which is put on by the Beverly Area Planning Association, draws approximately 3,500 runners from all over the world. An additional 6,000 supporters and spectators line the race route to cheer the runners on, and fill the festival grounds at Ridge Park. Hopefully you and your family can join us for this wonderful Memorial Day celebration.



On Saturday, June 7, 2014, Alderman Matt O'Shea, Senator Bill Cunningham, Representative Fran Hurley, and Midway Document Destruction will host a free paper shredding event for residents of the 19th Ward at Crosswinds Church, 10835 S. Pulaski Road. Residents can bring unwanted papers to Crosswinds to be shredded and later recycled by the Midway Document Destruction Mobile Shredding Truck. Document shredding is one of the most effective tools in preventing iden-



tity theft. Shredding documents also has positive environmental impacts; once shredded, all paper is recycled, thereby reducing the amount of waste in landfills.

Please note, only loose, unbound papers can be shredded; all staples or binders must be removed in advance. This service is free of charge for 19th Ward residents. Streetscape Project Updates

95th St. - Phase II

Phase II of the 95th Street Streetscape will extend the improvements currently found between Western Avenue & Leavitt Street further east to Damen Avenue. Improvements include ornamental 32-foot street light poles at the corners with smaller pedestrian level 18 foot light poles in between.

By varying the size of the poles, the entire area becomes better lit and the lines connecting them are buried resulting in fewer outages. The project will also include new sidewalks and curbs as needed, brick paver parkways, irrigated planter boxes, and

community identifiers. Existing medians will receive new irrigation & electrical systems as well as improved landscaping.

In preparation for these improvements, Peoples Gas and the Chicago Department of Water Management each started other infrastructure improvements in the area. Peoples Gas has already upgraded gas lines in the area and Water Management is in the process of installing a new water main. This project is expected to complete in July. Construction on the Streetscape will begin in late summer.



111th Street Meeting

On Wednesday, May 21st, Alderman Matt O'Shea, the Mount Greenwood Community & Business Association and Chicago Department of Transportation will host a community meeting at 7:00 pm at Mount Greenwood Park (3721 W. 111th St.) to review plans for streetscape improvements on 111th Street. The first phase of this project is expected to begin next year and will run from Central Park Ave. to Homan Ave. Plans include new, upgraded ornamental light poles, landscaping planters, new sidewalks and curbs, decorative community identifiers, and much more.

All residents are invited to view the plans and offer feedback that can be incorporated into the final project plans.



Walden Parkway

Alderman Matt O'Shea and the Beverly Ridge Homeowners' Association have worked closely with area business owners to begin a Streetscape project that would encompass the commercial portions of 99th Street between Longwood Drive and Vanderpoel Avenue and the 9900 block of S. Walden Pkwy. The project will include upgraded lighting similar to the poles used in the 95th Street streetscape project, a stamped concrete intersection at 99th & Walden Pkwy., planter boxes, new trees, and a landscaped half circle gateway to the Ridge Park green space along the 9800 block of S. Walden

Pkwy. Funding for this project has been approved and engineers are currently working to produce construction drawings for the project. The design process should be completed later this year. The Chicago Department of Transportation hopes to put the project out to bid and break ground on the improvements in Spring 2015. To maintain these improvements, local property owners have formed a Special Service Area (SSA). Beverly residents Katie & Miguel Nathwani purchased the former Koda Bistro building in April and plan to renovate the space to transform it into a retail store. Lisa Wilberding, an experienced quilter, will help manage the store.


The store will feature a wide selection of high quality quilter's cotton, thread, patterns and notions for quilters, embroiderers and sewing enthusiasts. These materials can be used to create a range of projects from traditional bed quilts and throw blankets to pillows, wall hangings, table runners, tote bags and apparel.

In addition, The Quilter's

Trunk plans to sell and service one or more brands of sewing machines that will include embroidery machines, sergers and long arm/free motion quilting machines. The goal of The Quilter's Trunk is to provide inspiration, knowledge and support across a wide range of project types and skill levels.

Quilts, Inc., a trade organization, estimates that 1 in 7 households is home to an active quilter (according to its 2010 industry survey), and that expenditures by quilters are more than \$3.5 billion per year. Chicago is host to a large quilt show every June at the Stephenson Convention Center that attracts

tens of thousands of visitors from across the United States. The Quilter's Trunk is a welcome addition to our business strip.

Year Round City Sticker Sales

All City of Chicago vehicle stickers will expire on June 30, 2014, with enforcement beginning on July 16, 2014. The City Clerk will mail our renewal forms during the last week of May, so please be on the lookout. New stickers can be purchased online at www.chicity-clerk.com. The City Clerk's Office will be selling stickers in our community on Wednesday, June 4th at Ridge Park, 9625 S. Longwood Drive, from Noon - 6:00 pm, and on Monday, July 7th, at the 19th Ward Mt. Greenwood Service Office, 3215 W. 111th St., from Noon - 6:00 pm.

In 2014, the City Clerk will transition to a year-round sticker sales system. Under the new system, City Stickers will expire six months from the expiration of a vehicle's Illinois State License Plate Registration (see chart). The schedule is staggered in this way to help motorists better budget for vehicle costs.

This means that when renewing a City

Sticker this year, motorists will be notified of their new renewal date, and given the option of either purchasing a prorated sticker or an extended vehicle sticker to get on the new renewal schedule. For example, if a vehicle's State Registration expires in April, its City Sticker will now expire in October.

In that scenario, a motorist can purchase a prorated sticker valid from July 2014 to October 2014, or an extended sticker valid from July 2014 to October 2015. Once a sticker has shifted to the new expiration month, standard annual sticker sales will resume. Please note, if

you choose to purchase the short term prorated sticker, and your sticker expires before January 2015, you will not receive an additional renewal notice. Senior Citizens will not be affected by the change to Year-Round Sales and will remain on a June-to-June renewal schedule. For more information, please visit www.chicityclerk.com.

Recorder Offers Free Service for Veterans

The Cook County Recorder of Deeds has recently opened a Veterans Service Office. Through this office, veterans and their families can avoid lines and get private and attentive service in a comfortable environment. In addition to traditional services, Veterans can also safeguard their DD-214 military discharge forms by recording them at the Cook County Recorder of Deeds Office.

These documents are critical when applying for well-deserved benefits such as medical care, educational opportunities, and VA loans for housing. Recording these documents protects them, while also allowing you or your family the ability to access them in a safe

and secure fashion if they are ever lost. Veterans can record the DD-214 and obtain a certified copy for free. In the future, if you need to retrieve a certified copy, it can be obtained for only \$1.25.

All DD-214s are protected from public view, and are available only to the person named in the document, the named person's dependents, the county veteran's service officer, and representatives from the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs. DD-214s filed with the Record of Deeds are not public records. If you have any questions about this service, or would like to make an appointment with the Veterans Service Office, please call (312) 603-5788.

Property Tax Appeals Due May 27, 2014

The Cook County Assessor appeal process is open for homeowners who would like to dispute their 2014 assessments, which will be reflected on their 2015 property tax bill. Property tax bills in Cook County are based on several factors including an individual home's proposed assessed valuation. The assessed valuation can be found on your property tax bill or by visiting the Assessor's website at www.cookcountyassessor.com. While several factors are used to determine that figure, sale price of similar homes in the area since the last reassessment is the main consideration.

If you believe the assessed value of your property is too high, you can file an appeal; residential property tax appeal forms are available at the 19th Ward Office or the Assessor's website. Please note, the deadline to file an appeal is May 27th.

If you are concerned that the assessed valuation of your home is not uniform with the assessed valuations of other homes, complete the appeal form and indicate your appeal is based on "lack of unifor-

mity." If you notice an error in the description of your property on the Notice of Proposed Assessed Valuation like incorrect square footage of living area or other inconsistency that may impact the value, complete the appeal form and indicate your appeal is based on "property description error." Please note, filing an appeal can trigger a thorough review of your assessment, that review can uncover information that would either increase or decrease an assessed value.

Later this year, the Cook County Board of Review will begin accepting property tax appeals. The Cook County Board of Review is a completely separate agency that only has the ability to reduce your assessed value or leave it unchanged. While every property owner has the ability to appeal with both agencies, some homeowners prefer to wait for the Board of Review. However, the Board of Review does not have the ability to change incorrect property characteristics. 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Legislative Update

Representative Hurley

As the Illinois State Legislature's spring session nears its scheduled May 31st adjournment, Rep. Fran Hurley continues working on a number of initiatives to encourage economic development and job growth, support the state's most vulnerable residents, and protect funding in the state budget for critical services like education, public safety and health care.

A longtime supporter of the Special Olympics, Hurley sponsored a proposal to boost funding for the Games through a lottery scratch-off game, with the proceeds benefitting the Illinois and Chicago Special Olympics organizations. The bill passed the Senate and will be considered by the House.

To help our community's small businesses succeed and reduce the financial burden on entrepreneurs, Hurley is co-sponsoring legislation to reduce filing fees for limited liability companies (LLCs). To help support local jobs, Hurley also co-sponsored a bill requiring the state to only purchase or rent vehicles assembled in the United States. The House approved the measure and is awaiting action in the Senate.

"My top priority is working to help create and retain good-paying jobs for

local residents," Hurley said. "Just as many of local families are conscious about the products they purchase, the state should lead by example by purchasing products assembled by American workers here in our communities."

As a member of a House budget committee, Hurley is meeting with state agencies, other organizations and lawmakers to help craft a state budget for the new fiscal year that begins July 1. Her goal is ensuring that state government is efficiently implementing programs that help taxpayers while maintaining vital services for seniors, veterans, the disabled, and our children.

To keep in touch with residents and receive community feedback on these and other important issues facing the state, Hurley and State Sen. Bill Cunningham encourage local residents to attend a Meet and Greet listening session at the 19th Ward Service Office on Wednesday, June 25 from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Senator Cunningham

During the Spring 2014 legislative session, State Senator Bill Cunningham has utilized his membership on various senate committees to promote public safety and improve educational opportunities in his district and throughout the state. Cunningham sponsored and passed legislation in the Senate Criminal Law Committee designed to give prosecutors additional tools when filing sexual assault and abuse charges (House Bill 4516) and he co-sponsored a bill aimed at extending the statute of limitations in rape cases to allow more time for the testing of DNA evidence (Senate Bill 2609).

Cunningham joined Representative Fran Hurley in passing the Neighborhood Restoration and Alternative Sentencing Job Training Act. This bill will enable the Cook County Sheriff and other sheriffs around the state to place inmates into work programs while serving their jail sentences on nonviolent charges. Sheriff Tom Dart plans to utilize the new law to expand a Cook County Boot Camp program in which nonviolent inmates work to demolish abandoned homes in blighted neighborhoods and replace them with alternative housing for the homeless and people with disabilities.

"This bill will not only ensure inmates do meaningful work during their jail time," Cunningham said. "It will also help nonviolent offenders develop skills to improve their prospects of finding employment when they return to the community."

As a member of the Senate's Education Committee, Cunningham has sponsored legislation to curb the growing number of standardized tests that elementary and high school students are subjected to in Illinois. Cunn-

ingham held a special senate committee hearing in April to help spotlight the issue. Robert Cahill, a life-long Beverly resident and teacher at Sutherland School, joined a group of teachers and education experts at the hearing to provide testimony about how classroom and homework time for Chicago school students is now being dominated by preparation for standardized tests.

"In order to meet federal, state, and local requirements, many of our children have to sit for five or six standardized tests every school year," Cunningham said at the hearing. "That saturation of testing places undo pressure on students and teachers, cuts into the instruction time our children experience, and threatens not to improve, but rather erode the education our kids receive."

Cunningham has also passed legislation requiring private schools to adhere to the same fire and emergency safety standards currently applied to public schools (SB 2710).

In order to improve the Illinois business climate and protect property taxpayers, Cunningham co-sponsored two pieces of legislation designed to keep money in the pockets of ordinary citizens. SB 2838 proposes to drastically lower the fees new businesses are required to pay to register in Illinois. And SB 2938, authored by Senator Emil Jones, would assist homeowners in recovering cash from Cook County if they have been overcharged for property taxes in previous years.

"No doubt, much work is left to be done in Springfield this year," Cunningham said. "But I've been honored to work on legislation aimed at making our streets safer and our schools better, while ensuring the rights of taxpayers are respected."

Buyer Beware: Beverly Fence Company

Beverly Fence Company is currently operating at 2626 W. 111th St. without a City of Chicago Business License. After receiving multiple complaints from customers the City of Chicago filed a series of lawsuits against the business both in the Cook County Circuit Court and in Administrative Hearing Court. After several years of legal proceedings, the City of Chicago's Department of Business Affairs and Consumer

Protection issued a "cease & desist" order demanding Beverly Fence Company halt all business operations at this location.

Common complaints from residents include substandard work product, leaving a job site in the middle of a project, and accepting a deposit and never returning to complete the work. Numerous attempts to reach the business owners have been unsuccessful. Some customers are even

pursuing legal action against the business. Under the terms of the cease & desist order, it is illegal for any representative of the Beverly Fence Company to work on the premises or in the field. If you see Beverly Fence Company working in the area, please report the incident to the 19th Ward Office at (773) 238-8766. If you are in the market for a new fence, please make sure to work with a licensed and bonded fence company.

Election Judges Needed

The Chicago Board of Elections is currently recruiting judges of election for the November 4, 2014 General Election. Election Judges are the officials responsible for administering the election in each polling place. The judges of election are the backbone of the electoral process.

On Election Day, every precinct has a team of judges that is responsible for setting up voting equipment at 5:00 am, conducting a fair, impartial and secure election, allowing voting from 6:00 am to 7:00 pm, and tabulating the vote totals and transmitting them to the Board of Elections after the polls close. Judges of election are paid \$170 upon completion of training and service on Election Day. Ex-

tra compensation is paid to judges who pick up the key envelope on either the Saturday or Sunday prior to Election Day, allow the use of their cell phone by all judges within the polling place on Election Day, or return the election materials to a receiving station on Election Night, or serve additional days in absentee voting, nursing-home voting or in post-election counting activities in the warehouse.

Please note, to serve as an Election Judge, you must be a registered voter in Cook County, and be able to speak, read and write English and perform basic math. Applications for Election Judge are available at the 19th Ward Office, 10400 S. Western Ave., or online at www.chicagoelections.com.

CPS Invests in Neighborhood Schools

The Chicago Public Schools recently announced a 2015 Capital Plan that includes significant investments in our neighborhood schools. Local improvements include new air conditioning at Clissold School (\$220,000) and Kellogg School (\$140,000). Sutherland School will receive new security cameras (\$150,000).

Cassell Elementary will receive a \$3.3 million expansion including an 8 room modular building and new playground. These additional classrooms will allow students to regain their computer and science labs. Construction will begin in mid-summer and the classrooms and playground are expected to be ready for the start of the 2014 school year.

In addition to these improvements, Morgan Park High School will be transitioning to a Wall-to-Wall International Baccalaureate program in the 2014-2015 School Year. In addition to significant professional development opportunities for teachers, this shift also includes major improvements to the campus. Morgan Park will receive a complete upgrade of two computer labs, one chemistry lab, and one biology lab. The school will also receive ADA upgrades including improvements to the main office, auditorium, and bathrooms. This \$2.5 million project will also

be in place for the new school year. As the school shifts to this new, rigorous curriculum model, we have also forged an innovative High School / University partner-

ship with Saint Xavier University. Through this partnership, teachers will receive high quality professional development not only in teaching practices, but also in

key content areas. Students will have several dual enrollment options, and benefit from college preparedness and transition programs offered by the University.





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Common Blue Cart Contaminates

Beverly, Morgan Park & Mt. Greenwood have always been on the forefront of environmental issues. However, in recent months non-recyclable materials or “contaminants” have become more common in our blue carts. Just as a reminder, below is a list of common recycling contaminants that should not be in the Blue Recycle Cart.

Plastic Bags: Plastic bags are not recyclable through the Residential Blue Cart Recycling program. Even if the plastic bag has a recycling triangle on it, plastic bags cannot be tossed into the Blue Cart. Rather, plastic bags can be dropped off at participating retail or wholesale stores with an in-store recycling program, like grocery store chains or pharmacy chains.

Shredded Paper: Paper is recyclable, but shredded paper should not be recycled through the Blue Cart program. Shredded paper cannot be properly sorted out of the recycling stream, causing contamination.



Styrofoam (also known as #6 Plastics): Styrofoam and other plastics with the #6 recycling triangle are not recyclable through the Blue Cart program. Common #6 plastics are the tops of your Starbucks cup, egg cartons and packaging foam.

Un-Numbered Plastics are not Recyclable: If a plastic item does not include a recycling triangle, then the item is not recyclable. Items like plastic storage containers, plastic hangers, plastic cutlery, CD cases and baby bottles are not recyclable.

Yard Waste: Yard waste is not accepted through the Blue Cart. Yard Waste should be bagged separately and placed next to your black garbage cart for collection.

Electronics & Household Chemicals: Electronics like televisions and cell phones and household chemicals are not accepted in the Blue Cart program. Electronics and household chemicals can be recycled at the City’s Household Chemicals and Computer Recycling Facility, located at 1150 N. North Branch.

City to Plant 5,400 Trees in 2014

This April, the City of Chicago announced plans to plant 5,400 trees in neighborhoods across Chicago this year. The Chicago Department of Transportation will plant more than 2,600 of those trees through various infrastructure improvement projects. The remaining 2,800 trees will be planted by the Department of Streets and Sanitation, 174 of which will be planted in the 19th Ward. In addition to the new tree planting, approximately \$2.9 million has been budgeted for tree inoculation and removal.

"Chicago was one of the first cities where planting trees and urban forests were part of the City's plan and design," said Mayor Rahm Emanuel. "Not only do trees beautify our neighborhoods, but they clean our air, provide shade, and

improve our quality of life to make our City in a Garden an even better place to live."

"The Department of Streets and Sanitation is committed to maintaining the health and vibrancy of 500,000 Chicago parkway trees," said Commissioner Charles Williams. "We will continue to plant diverse tree species throughout the City and inoculate all viable Ash trees on city parkways against the Emerald Ash Borer."

Chicago has an estimated 3.5 million trees on both public and private property, which cover more than 17 percent of the area, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Chicago's urban forest removes about 25,000 tons of carbon per year and about 900 tons of air pollution annually.



Street Sweeping Begins

Street sweeping season officially began this April. Every street in our community should be swept a minimum of 3 times each year. A complete street sweeping schedule can be found online at www.the19thward.com.

Bright orange "no parking" street sweeping signs will be posted on residential streets 24 hours prior to a sweeping. Tickets are issued for any cars that remain on the street during scheduled street sweeping. Please keep an eye out for the orange signs and remind your neighbors to move their cars

on street sweeping days.

Street sweepers are slowed down significantly by large volumes of leaves or litter. Please refrain from raking leaves or other debris into the streets and pick up any litter along the curb rather than leaving it for the street sweepers. The more cooperation we have from community residents, the more frequently we can sweep your street.

Thank you for being a good neighbor and working with us to make the 19th Ward a clean and safe community.


