## Get Behind the Vest Pancake Breakfast - 2/23

19th Ward Alderman Matthew O'Shea will host his sixth annual pancake breakfast benefiting the Chicago Police Memorial Foundation's "Get Behind the Vest" initiative, on Sunday, February 23rd, 2020, at St. John Fisher School, 10200 S. Washtenaw Ave., from 8:00 am - 12:00 pm. The 2019 event was the largest to date with over 2000 people in attendance, and raising nearly \$34,000 in conjunction with school fundraisers and local business support.

Admission is \$5 per person or \$25 for families. All money raised will be donated to the Chicago Police Memorial Foundation's Get Behind the Vest initiative, which actively raises funds to replace bullet proof vests for Chicago Police officers.

Bullet proof vests need to be replaced every five years, at a cost to police officers of about \$650. Over the past six years, the Chicago Police Memorial Foundation has replaced over 9,000 outdated bullet proof vests. Currently, there are 4200 vests that are eligible to be replaced.

Ald. O'Shea began hosting the pancake breakfast in 2015, and together with school fundraisers

throughout the Beverly, Mount Greenwood and Morgan Park community, has raised over \$150,000 for the Get Behind the Vest initiative.

In addition to the pancake breakfast, Ald. O'Shea will once again

be working with local schools to organize "dress down days" and other student-based fundraisers to raise additional funds for bullet proof vests.

"The men and women in the Chicago Police Department leave their families and loved ones every day to protect our community, putting themselves in dangerous situations on a daily basis," said Ald. O'Shea. "Now more than ever, we need to do all that we can to help protect those who protect us. My community is home to thousands of Chicago Police officers, who understand how important lifesaving equipment is on the job. It is my hope that through my pancake

breakfast, we can continue to help replace bullet proof vests for our officers and help to ensure their safety on the streets. I'd like to once again thank Original Pancake House-Beverly, Kean Gas Station, our

local schools and businesses who support our efforts, as well as the thousands of residents and police supporters who attend this breakfast each year."

Ald. O'Shea sits on the Chicago Police Memorial Foundation Advisory Board and the Chicago Police Chaplains Ministry Board of Directors. He represents the communities of Beverly Morgan Park and Mount Greenwood, where thousands of first responders reside.

The pancake breakfast is generously supported and cohosted by the Original Pancake House - Beverly. All pancake batter, condiments and cooking supplies will be donated by the Harrigan Family, who have operated the Original Pancake House for more than fifty years. ## **Participate in 19th** Ward Cancer Study

19th Ward residents age 35 or older are invited to participate in the Chicago Multiethnic Prevention and Surveillance Study (COM-PASS) conducted by the University of Chicago; participants who successfully complete the full survey will receive \$50 in Visa gift cards. Staff from the University of Chicago will be at the 19th Ward Office at 10400 S. Western Ave. on Saturday, February 29th, and Saturday, March 21st from 9:00am to 2:00pm to enroll participants and collect study data. Participants will be asked to complete three online questionnaires and provide blood, urine and saliva samples. The entire process takes approximately one hour and a government issued photo ID is required. Participants can also receive optional home radon monitoring.

University of Chicago on this project to learn why certain population groups have higher rates of cancer and chronic diseases than others. The study explores the connections between genetics, environment, health behaviors, and long term health outcomes.

### **Nicky's Grill Expands** 105th & Western to

Nicky's Grill & Yogurt, a longtime neighborhood favorite that has operated at 10255 S. Western Ave. for the past 20 years recently announced plans to relocate to 10500 S. Western Ave. in the space formerly occupied by Taqueria Valparaiso. The new space will be completely renovated. The existing 1,000 square foot floor plan will double to 2,000 feet and the drive through will be removed. Once complete, the facility will include rooftop dining, a garage style overhead door, and outdoor seating for patrons.

The \$1 million community investment will include two stacked shipping containers that will allow for 18 foot ceilings and an open air dining space. ## **O'Shea Testifies Before Congress on Railroad Concerns**

On Wednesday, February 5th, Alderman Matt O'Shea testified before the Congressional Railroad Subcommittee about the impact of block railroad crossings in the 19th Ward. The primary public safety issue according to O'Shea, is the inability of emergency vehicles to respond to life and death situations when crossings are blocked. Blocked crossings have been a significant issue since CSX Railroad's 2012 acquisition of the Elsdon Line, which runs parallel to Sacramento Ave. throughout Evergreen Park, Chicago's 19th Ward and Blue Island. "It is not uncommon for an intersection to be blocked for over 10 minutes" said O'Shea. "We've had blockages last for over an hour. That's an hour that ambulances and fire trucks are unable to respond to critical calls for service" he added. O'Shea also stressed that a blocked crossing on 95th Street cuts off access to Christ Hospital, the nearest trauma center.

tee on Railroads, Pipelines and Hazardous Materials), is part of the House Transportation and Infrastructure (T&I) Committee. The Railroad Subcommittee is one of six subcommittees of the T&I Committee and has jurisdiction over all federal policy and regulation with respect to railroads, pipelines and the movement of hazardous materials. The hearing was presided over by sub-committee Chairman Dan Lipinski. "I am committed to exploring innovative solutions that will improve safety and end the gridlock caused by idling or broken-down trains in the Chicago area and around the country," said Congressman Lipinski. The hearing sought to raise awareness of some of the grade crossing issues happening not only in Chicago but throughout the country. "Local government is hamstrung on this issue. We do not have the authority to regulate railroads. We need federal intervention and regulation to address very real safety concerns" said O'Shea.

This year, the 19th Ward and the Beverly Area Planning Association are collaborating to offer two free series of Smart Tech Seniors classes hosted by Smith Village in June and by Mercy Circle in September.

"Response to these classes have been wonderful, close to 200 people attended previous classes. So, we know that people want to learn how to use different the features of their smartphones without going back to where they were purchased," says Alderman Matt O'Shea.

During late February, BAPA and the 19th Ward will conduct an online survey for all 19th ward senior citizens. This online easy-touse survey will be distributed via email to everyone who registered for Tech Tuesday classes at Smith Village during June 2018 and Smart Tech Seniors classes at Mercy Circle during November 2019. The survey also will be made available through weekly eblasts by both organizations.

"The responses to this survey will help us learn which topics were most helpful and those that should be repeated. People also will be asked to suggest additional subject matter and tips to add to our classes," adds Mary Jo Viero, executive director, Beverly Area Planning Association.

Responses will be tallied and reported in the May editions of the 19th Ward Quarterly and The Villager when specific dates for the June and September series will be announced. The information gathered will be used to guide the curriculum for the 2020 Smart Tech Seniors series.


## **19th Ward Seeks Election Judges**


The Chicago Board of Elections is seeking individuals to serve as election judges for the Municipal Election on Tuesday, March 17, 2020. Election judges administer election procedures in polling places and ensure that voters' rights are protected and respected on Election Day. Election judges receive pay for their services. Election judges are the officials responsible for the conduct of the election in the polling place. Responsibilities include opening the polling place and setting up the voting equipment by 5:00 am on Election Day; conducting a fair, impartial and secure election in the polling place; and tabulating the vote totals for the precinct and transmitting the results to Election central after the polls close at 7:00 pm.

"Election judges serve an important role in our democratic process, by ensuring an unbiased and uncompromised voting location," said Alderman O'Shea. "Being an Election Judge is a great way for people to not only meet residents of their community, but also take an active role in the election process."

Among the requirements to become a Judge of Election, individuals must:

- Be a registered voter in Cook County (U.S. citizens at least 18 years of age);
- Be able to speak, read and write English;
- Be able to perform basic math;
- Not be a committeeman, precinct captain or candidate and must agree not to serve as a judge if they become one;
- Be of good repute and character and not a registered sex offender anywhere in the United States and not have committed a crime that would require registering as a sex offender anywhere in the United States;



## **Hurley Highlights Senior Citizen Property Tax Deferral Program**

To help provide local seniors property tax relief, state Rep. Fran Hurley, is encouraging homeowners over the age of 65 with an annual household income of \$55,000 or less to apply to the Senior Citizen Real Estate Tax Deferral Program to help cover the cost of property tax payments.

"As property taxes continue to skyrocket each and every year, the sad reality is that some seniors simply cannot afford to stay in their homes," said Hurley. "I have continually worked for property tax relief, especially for senior homeowners, many of whom live on a fixed income. No senior should have to choose between staying in their home and paying for their prescriptions or groceries."

To help cover the cost of Cook County property tax payments, Hurley is encouraging senior homeowners to visit cookcountytreasurer.com and submit an application for the Senior Citizen Real Estate Tax Deferral Program. The State of Illinois issues the loans, which do not have to be repaid until the property is sold or the homeowner dies. An interest rate of 6% per year is charged by the state. To qualify for a yearly loan of up to \$5,000, the homeowner's annual income must be under \$55,000 per year and they must be 65 by June 1 of the year in which the application is made. The application deadline is March 1, 2020.

"The Senior Citizen Real Estate Tax Deferral Program provides a great solution for seniors to help cover the cost of their property tax payments, allowing them to stay in the home they have built their lives in," continued Hurley. "I encourage seniors who qualify to get their applications in as soon as possible, as the first tax payment installment date is coming up quickly."

ture was found to be in violation of city building code; moreover, it was deemed to be a threat to public safety and was ultimately demolished.



## **Tax Savings for Seniors**

Residents born in 1954 or earlier are eligible and can apply for a senior exemption on their property taxes this year. Forms are available for download at www.cookcountyassessor.com or can be obtained at both 19th Ward service offices. Please pay particular attention to the documentation requirements and include all necessary information when you apply. Applications are also available for the senior freeze exemption. Seniors with an income under \$65,000 qualify for the senior freeze exemption and but must re-apply for that exemption every year. Prior senior freeze recipients received applications in January, please mail those back as soon as possible. New homeowners who purchased their homes before January 1, 2019 will receive a homeowner's exemption form the first week in February. Thanks to legislation introduced by State Representative Fran Hurley and Senator Bill Cunningham, getting your se-

### nior exemption will now be a lot easier. Senior exemptions will now be automatically renewed, no need to mail in an application. Prior recipients of the senior exemption


should have received a letter about their exemption status in January. If you have any questions please call the 19th Ward Service Office at (773) 238-8766 or the Cook County Assessor at (312) 443-7550. The City of Chicago also offers a senior exemption for sewer fees. Applications are available and can be turned in at the 19th Ward Service Office. After an application is filled out and all the necessary documentation is received, the sewer charge on your water bill is completely removed. There are no income requirements and you can apply the day you turn 65. In order to qualify the property must be your primary residence. Not sure if you are already receiving this savings? Take a look at your water bill, if the sewer charge is already \$0, you are set!

### Chicago Public Schools 2020 Local School Council (LSC) Elections

The 2020 Local School Council elections will be held on Wednesday, April 22nd, for elementary schools and Thursday, April 23rd for high schools. Local School Councils (LSC) provide an opportunity to become engaged in your school community and to play an active role in making policy decisions affecting your school. LSC members are elected every two years

Chicago Public

Schools

by parents, community members, and school staff. Members serve two-year terms, with the exception of high school student representatives, who serve one-year terms.

LSCs are responsible for:

- Monitoring the school improvement plan.
- Monitoring the school's budget and expenditures.
- Evaluating their school's principal annually, as well as selecting a new contract principal for their school or renewing the contract of their current principal.

### How to Apply

The application window for the 2020 LSC elections opened on December 2, 2019. To apply, candidates must download and fill out the application forms and return them with two forms of identification to the school for which they intend to run as a candidate by March 5, 2020 at 3:00pm.

### How to Vote

Parent and community members may vote by going to their neighborhood CPS public school. In order to vote, as a "Parent", one must have a child enrolled and attend the school or to vote as a "Community Member", one must live within the LSC voting boundaries of the school.

At the school, voters will be directed to the Polling Station where an Election Judge will verify their eligibility to vote (voters are required to have two forms of identification), and instructions will be provided on how to complete the ballot. Polling stations are open from 6:00am - 7:00pm.
