In response to recent reductions in services to veterans due to governmental budget cuts, the 19th Ward is partnering with Rosecrance Behavioral Health and the Road Home Program at Rush to host a resource fair for veterans on Wednesday, May 14th from 4-7 p.m. at The Vineyard, 2121 W. 95th Street. Complimentary appetizers and soft drinks will be available for veterans to enjoy while they visit with a variety of organizations including Honor Flight Chicago, the Wounded Warrior Project, Project Headspace and Timing, Illinois Joining Forces, and more.

"Now more than ever, our United States Veterans need our support. "By gathering a variety of resources for veterans in one place, we hope to educate veterans about services that they may not know are available to them," explained Alderman



Matt O'Shea. Modie Lavin, Gold Star Mother and Senior Outreach Coordinator of the Road Home Program at Rush adds, "This community resource fair for veterans and their families is more than just an event - it's a lifeline. It's about us showing up for them not just in words, but in action. It's a chance to connect our veterans with services they might not even know exist. More importantly, it sends a clear message: you're not alone, we stand with you and this community truly has their back. By bringing together local organizations and community members, we are building a stronger, more informed, and more compassionate network of care right where it matters most - at home."

Also featured at the resource fair will be the Road Home Program's traveling exhibit, "Artfully Facing Trauma" which gives voice to the silent battles our veterans face every day. Through these powerful masks, we see the contrast between how they appear on the outside and how they feel within – a striking reminder of the importance of mental health and the healing power of art therapy. 

State Senator Bill Cunningham Recipient of the Reuben Soderstrom Award for Being a Labor Champion

"Unions represent an essential pillar for protecting Illinois workers and our communities as a whole," said Cunningham, a Democrat who represents portions of Chicago and the Southwest Suburbs. "Standing in solidarity with labor is something one should do regardless of recognition, but I am happy to accept the award and encourage my colleagues to keep up the good fight."

Reuben G. Soderstrom was a key figure in Illinois politics and changed American labor history. He was the first president of the Il-



linois AFL-CIO from 1958-1970, increasing the organization's membership by five times. Soderstrom fought to end discrimination in

the workplace and spearheaded the AFL-CIO merger. The award is given to those who have raised their voice on behalf of organized labor in the Illinois General Assembly.

Cunningham received the award in part due to his work on extending workers' compensation protections, strengthening pension benefits for retired workers, and making sure first responders received proper compensation and benefits for their work during the COVID-19 pandemic. Cunningham has been an ally to labor his entire career, voting against anti-union measures, including so-called "Right to Work" laws back in 2017.

Cunningham vows to continue his work to fight for labor groups.

Gill Advances Plan Encouraging Better Investment in Emergency Response Vehicles

Municipalities would be required to set aside additional resources for ambulance and fire emergency vehicles under a plan recently advanced out of a House committee by State Representative Mary Gill. "When our firefighters and paramedics are called to an emergency, they deserve to have the tools they need to do their job safely and effectively," Gill said. "Unfortunately, I have heard from fire union representatives that there have been times when stations have been unable to go to fires due to having no working fire engines on site. This is an unacceptable hazard, and we need to make sure municipalities are being proactive in responsibly investing in upkeep."

Under Gill's House Bill 2977, municipalities must place at least ten percent of all insurance reimbursements for ambulance and fire services into a fund dedicated

to purchasing and maintaining ambulances, fire engines, and other vehicles used for emergency services. Gill introduced the plan after learning from union fire officials that reimbursements currently go into mu-

nicipal general revenue funds. As a result, such funds can be spent on items or needs unrelated to fire or emergency medical services.

"When there is an emergency,

lives are at stake, and time matters, we need to make sure our emergency response vehicles are always ready to meet the moment, " Gill said. "Lets make sure we are taking the steps necessary to have modern, well-maintained equipment that is always available."

House Bill 2977 passed the Police & Fire Committee with bipartisan support and now heads to the full House for consideration.



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The Reuben P. Layton House: A Reminder of Beverly's History*

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The Rock Island Magazine, produced by the railroad company that ran the commuter train lines through the south side Chicago communities, stated in 1921 that Chicago's Beverly Hills was "one of the most beautiful residential sections of the city."

The article described the neighborhoods along the Ridge Suburban Line, calling attention to "the continuous hill; the large, shaded lots, heavily wooded with oak trees; the forest preserve and parks; and the beautiful residences that make this section of the city one of the most desirable from the home standpoint."

The Reuben P. Layton House at 10324 S. Longwood Drive is a fine example of one of those "beautiful residences" that established the community's reputation.

At the time the house was built in 1890, the area was known as "Tracy," taken from Tracy Avenue, the early name of 103rd Street, and the name of the Rock Island station on that street. Tracy was part of the Village of Washington Heights, which in turn became part of Chicago in 1890.

The Layton house, architect unknown, joined two other newly built residences along the Blue Island Ridge which became local landmarks.

The first was the Robert C. Givins House, also known as the Givins Beverly Castle, built in 1886-87 at the corner of today's 103rd Street and Longwood Drive. Givins was a real estate developer, lawyer, and novelist.

The second was the Horace E. Horton House at 10200 S. Longwood Drive, built in 1890 for the founder of the Chicago Bridge & Iron Company.

Like Givins and Horton, Layton was a successful businessman. He was born in New York State in 1831 and moved to Chicago in the 1860s, where he prospered with interests in real estate, railroads, life and property insurance, and mining and petroleum companies.

Following the Great Chicago Fire in 1871, people started moving out of the city into the suburbs. Washington Heights became prime real estate, in large part due to the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad commuter line that was established there in 1870, making travel to the city for business, shopping, and cultural events more accessible and convenient. Layton and his wife, Harriet Norton Layton, and their daughters, lived farther east in Washington Heights for at least a decade before moving to Longwood Drive. They were involved in Washington Heights real estate transactions for many years, as well as community activities. In 1887, for example, Layton was appointed a member of the Financial Committee to raise funds to build the Church of the Mediator at 110th Street and Hoyne Avenue

for the first Episcopalian congregation established on the south side of Chicago.

The foresight of men like Layton to invest in real estate in the growing city and suburbs made them wealthy, and some built beautiful homes along the scenic Ridge.

The Layton family lived in the house until 1905. Other historically important families followed them.

Thomas F. and Ruth Seay and their daughter lived in the house in the 1940s-1950s. He was the founder of Seay and Thomas, Inc., prominent realtors, mortgage bankers, and land developers, and a leader of the Chicago Real Estate Board.

Seay was a Master Mason, and in 1956 while living on the Ridge, he became the Potentate of the Medinah Temple, overseeing the famous Shrine Circus. In 1967, he became the Imperial Potentate of the Ancient Arabic Order, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, the highest position in the "Shriners," which at the time was a world-wide organization with 800,000 members.

He was a director of the Illinois Masonic Hospital, Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children, and the Salvation Army, and active with Cerebral Palsy organizations and many real estate and business groups. A Salvation Army Center on the north side of the city was named for him.

In 1960, the house became the property of William A. and Patricia Boyd. Boyd was the founder and president of Vail Rubber Products Corporation, and "Pat" was a wellknown community supporter, serving on the board of Little Company of Mary Hospital, and volunteering with St. Barnabas Parish, Meals on Wheels, the Beverly Arts Center, the Ridge Historical Society (RHS), and the Beverly Area Planning Association. The Boyd family owned the house for sixty years and nine Boyd children grew up there.

and the Boyd family found one at the Layton House, a hidden room under the attic floor, accessible by a ladder. Inside the hidden room, they found two swords they had



authenticated as U.S. Civil Warera, a vintage woman's shoe, and an old newspaper that they gave to RHS.

It was thought the room might have served as a hiding place on the Underground Railroad during the Civil War, but the house was not built until twenty-five years after the war ended. House plans then, however, did sometimes include hidden rooms for storing valuable, likely a solution for this mystery.

The Layton House is included in the Longwood Drive District, established by the City of Chicago Landmarks Commission in 1981. This historic designation protects the house from external alteration without approval. After recent issues with construction work at the house, there is optimism that the new owner will take corrective action.

In 1995, almost seventy-five years after the Rock Island Magazine article, the Chicago Tribune described Beverly/Morgan Park

as an "outdoor museum of architectural styles."

er, the collective visual richness of Beverly/Morgan Park that makes these neighborhoods a treat to visit and a delight in which to live."

Every time a historic building is torn down and replaced with a new structure or significantly altered from the original, some of the uniqueness and charm, that makes Beverly so special is lost forever.

It is imperative to preserve a home like the Reuben P. Layton House to maintain the essence that preservationists refer to as the "visual cohesiveness" of the community, the look that everything fits together.

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Gill Effort Expands Awareness of Lifesaving Silver Alerts with Developmental Disability Community

A measure being led by State Representative Mary Gill would expand the ability for the Illinois State Police (ISP) and the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) to expand awareness of

their Endangered Missing Person Advisory system by better connecting with individuals with developmental disabilities and relevant organizations that serve them.

"Our Endangered Missing Person Advisory syssometimes tem, known as a Silver Alert, is a critical

tool to help find vulnerable individuals who are lost and need proper care," Gill said. "This measure will help expand lifesaving awareness of this critical program."

Currently, ISP and IDHS manage a community outreach program to promote awareness of Silver Alerts in developmental disability facilities. Senate Bill 1548



would further enable them to use resources to conduct outreach to individuals with developmental disabilities and organizations that serve people with developmental disabilities.

> Silver Alerts are a public notification system used by law enforcement to locate missing individuals that may be at risk of harm or injury.

"When someone becomes lost, hours and minutes matter," Gill said. "Ensuring more people and more families know where to turn can

help deliver better outcomes and prevent unnecessary tragedies."

Following bipartisan passage in the Illinois Senate, Gill is stewarding Senate Bill 1548 in the House. It is scheduled to be heard in the House Restorative Justice and Public Safety Committee.

Heaven Didn't Wait: A Self-Appointed Therapy Dog Finds His Flock

On May 1st a three-year-old named Duke willingly submitted to being feted and fawned over by his adopted family - that is the family he adopted, not the other way around.

Duke, a Chihuahua-Papillon mix, arrived at Mercy Circle on the morning of November 1, 2024, and as recounted by Avis Clendenen, the senior living community's director of pastoral care, "scampered in like he knew exactly where he was and where he intended to go." Both of those assessments turned out to be true, but it took a little most days, they knew Duke needed a more stimulating environment. He already had occasionally felt the call of the open yard; this time, they weren't sure he would come back at all.

As it turns out, Mercy Circle was already looking for a dog: Duke was literally the answer to



while for the humans to catch up.

Annie Riedmuller quickly took charge. The life enrichment coordinator for residents in Baggot Street, the memory care wing at Mercy Circle, Riedmuller has a certain way with animals, leading to her lifelong reputation as a "dog whisperer." She had the pup checked for an identification chip no such luck - and then contacted local police and posted a photo on social media. Later that day, she received a call from the dog's owner.

Duke had been brought into his previous family's life to provide a comforting presence after a house fire, which had traumatized one of the children. He did his job well. But now, with the parents at work their prayers. A few days ear-Riedmuller lier,

and executive director Francis Lachowicz had mused about finding a therapy dog for the residents at Baggot Street. Both women were keenly aware of studies (as well as first-hand observations) that show the calming effect and pure joy that animals can bring, especially to those struggling with dementia. The conversation ended with Lachowicz saying, "Pray God sends us the perfect dog."

Duke strolled in on the evening of All Saints Day, leading Clendenen to observe: "That's when the season of All Saints/All Souls – when the veil between this





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At Smith Village, C.N.A. Chuck Patano Seeks More Responsibilities as an R.N.

During his clinical rotation at the University of Chicago, Chuck Patano noticed something odd about one of his patients, a fiveyear-old boy with burns over seventy-five percent of his body. "When the boy's mom would visit by herself, everything was fine," says Patano, a personable certified nursing assistant at Smith Village's Greenleaf Rehabilitation center. "But whenever she came in with the boy's stepfather, he showed signs of distress. The kid just started having a meltdown."

C.N.A.s are trained to be observant, and Patano's studies had taught him that such a reaction raised alarms. He reported his suspicion to his supervisors. "That's how we learned the real source of his injury." The hospital had been told the burns resulted from an accident, but further investigation revealed that the stepfather had abused the child by scalding him with boiling water. Patano's quick thinking might have saved the boy's life.

"His mother kept acting as if nothing was the problem," he recalls. "It opened my eyes to how vulnerable children, and the elderly really are."

Marti Jatis, Smith Village's ex-

ecutive director, describes Patano as "a very caring individual. Together, we got through COVID-19," she says; both worked long hours to contain the pandemic at Smith Village. "That was the most challenging time since I had been certified as a C.N.A.," Patano admits. "Getting up and coming back, after a 16-hour shift for two weeks straight, after maybe three hours sleep."

Jatis had become a mentor to Patano guiding him to pursue a career in nursing to become a registered nurse, which will happen once he passes his board exam this summer, and following his May graduation from Judson University in Hoffman Estates. "Chuck really gets a team to rally around him," Jatis adds. "He'll be an excellent R.N. I'm happy he's following this path to fulfill his dream."

That path winds through Patano's biography – his mother and a cousin are nurse – but Patano did not pursue nursing at first. The Oklahoma native tried studying journalism, then criminal justice in college, and then his dad said, "You're wasting our money there. Figure it out." In 2011, he relocated to Oak Lawn, where he spent a summer deciding that healthcare



was the path after all. Having previously gotten his C.N.A. license, he went to work at Smith Village in 2012, where his familiarity with medical terms and hospital procedures served as a solid foundation for his duties.

While he sees healthcare administration as an eventual landing spot, Patano says that nursing has taught him the value of patience, empathy, teamwork and more: "I have grown up and learned so much about human nature. And just when I think I have learned a lot, something comes up, and I realize that I will never stop learning."

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
